


A facsimile of an invoice heading for David Nicholson's Rushden garage, dating from the 1920s.


Nicholson ventured into bus and charabanc operation in May 1913 as disclosed in paper NN-RU1, but this lasted for only a short time. In June 1920 it seems that David Nicholson acquired an ex-War Department B-type Daimler saloon bus seating forty passengers, which he offered for sale as shown in the advertisement appearing on the following page.


Nicholson's advertisement for the sale of a forty-seat Daimler saloon bus.

Evidently local bus operators failed to rush to buy the Daimler Nicholson had for sale, so he decided to use it himself by advertising an excursion to Woburn Sands on Sunday 11th July 1920, starting from Wellingborough and picking up at Wollaston and Bozeat. Nicholson set up a ticket agency at the Central Studio in Silver Street, Wellingborough.

The Woburn Sands excursion was repeated on the following Sunday with outings to Hunstanton picking up at Wellingborough, Rushden and Finedon on the first two Sundays in August. Other destinations followed with the final advertisement for an excursion noted for a trip to Yarmouth Races on 13th September 1920




Nicholson's final advertisement for an excursion in September 1920.

Little is known about the Daimler operated by Nicholson, which was advertised as a "B-type", seated forty passengers and was named "Invincible". It was probably not originally registered in Northamptonshire although Nicholson did have a 35/40hp Daimler lorry with a War Department style dark green body, that was registered as BD 3931 on 9th December 1919. At his Works at Rushden Nicholson is reputed to have built several bus bodies, including one which was a double-decker. Accordingly it is possible, but by no means certain, that BD 3931 was fitted with a bus body by Nicholson prior to being offered for sale.

With the onset of winter, David Nicholson next advertised a daily bus service from Irthlingborough to Northampton via Wellingborough as shown in the advertisement below. It is not clear from the timetable whether just the first journey departed from Irthlingborough and the rest from Wellingborough

At this point in time David Nicholson seems to have turned his attention, with others, to the formation of Progressive Motor Omnibus Services (Wellingborough) Ltd (NN-PR3). No doubt this latter company continued the Irthlingborough to Northampton service started by Nicholson and maybe they acquired "Invincible"?
